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Island having a convention and you just walk in and they offer you lunch at that time, then that would be an incidental kind of thing. It's not the primary reason. They didn't invite all of the senators, but that is a different kind of situation.

SENATOR RAIKES: So, for example, if they had a two-week...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR RAIKES: ...a two-week convention and one part of that two-week convention was...was a noon luncheon for legislators, then the primary reason for the convention would be...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: No. No, Senator, they would have to report that noon luncheon for the senators because the primary reason...

SENATOR RAIKES: Okay.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: ...for that...that luncheon was that senators would be there and they would mingle, et cetera, et cetera.

SENATOR RAIKES: Okay. One other question then. It says down here toward the bottom of the second page: admission to state-owned facilities or state-regulated industries or events are permissible regardless of value.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Correct.

SENATOR RAIKES: Now, I'm not sure what that means. I can't accept a gift of more than \$50 unless it's a football ticket?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Exactly. Football ticket, or tickets to the Lied, or whatever it happens to be, those are excepted...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: ...but reportable.

SENATOR RAIKES: Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Raikes. Senator Dierks,
