that's reported is the money actually spent in aggregate on that group of 49, or however many attend.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Or whoever many...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Or on the individual who maybe comes by when it's...when this group meeting isn't the primary cause, the walk-in, if you will, then they would have to report the lunch for that walk-in.

SENATOR COORDSEN: That's...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Am I getting your question?

SENATOR COORDSEN: Yeah. That's my understanding.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Okay.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Now, as I understand how it works from the practical standpoint today, that most people who are registered lobbyists do in fact report all of the expenses in order to be safe. And that's something that concerns many members of the body, is the overreporting of lobbying expenses that are credited against a number of members of the Legislature. This won't at all keep overreporting from happening, will it? This amendment will not prevent overreporting, which is the reporting of all of the expenses of a convention...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Well, I certainly...

SENATOR COORDSEN: ...if one or two members show up?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: I certainly hope it does, Senator Coordsen.

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Okay.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Because I think, through our discussion here today and the language that's a little bit stronger in the bill, that we make it clear what we want here.
