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you any time that you'd like to respond.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Schimek, about a minute and a half.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Thank you.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Senator Brashear, I think you've raised an interesting point, and I think that we need to discuss it. And at...I think you probably have hit on something we want to make certain that we cover. The Board of Regents, for instance, ought to be covered by this. And so we need to look at our definitions carefully...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: ...in this regard, and we will be doing that. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Brashear and Senator Schimek. Senator Vrtiska, on the Coordsen amendment.

SENATOR VRTISKA: Thank you, Senator Cudaback and members of the body. This is an interesting discussion. And I don't suspect there are very many on the floor who would disagree that we need to make some changes. But...and we need to...first of all, we need to find out where we're going and how we're going to be able to adhere to the new regulations. Senator Schimek, could I ask you a question?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Schimek, would you respond to a question from Senator Vrtiska?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes.

SENATOR VRTISKA: Senator Schimek, I was listening to the...have been listening to the debate, and a thought came to me. If you get a gift from somebody, for example, a ticket to an event, and you don't use it, what do you do? You send it back? Or do you make provisions to allow that your received it? How you do you handle that?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Send it back.
