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here's how we go about it. I don't want that to happen either. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Kristensen. Senator Schimek, on the Beutler amendment to the committee amendment.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes. Thank you, Mr. President, members of the body. I want to clarify one thing and that is that, remember, again, we're talking about two different kinds of reporting here. And in the second kind of reporting, the financial interest which you do, it...you do not have to report a gift either from your immediate family or from a relative, which, I don't know if that's come out in this discussion or not. So that would mean your aunt or your uncle or your grandfather or whomever. As long as they are a relative, you do not have to do that. Second point I'd like to make, I think, is that gifts of \$50 value are rare around here. They generally fall in the category of a four or five dollar coffee mug that...that's generally what these categories of gifts are. Then the third point I'd like to make, Senator Beutler, and this goes to your amendment, I particularly don't know that we want to do especially the second part of your amendment, which is on the financial interest portion, because this would require your best friend, who for some unknown reason wants to give you a really neat gift one year...maybe it's your 50th wedding anniversary or whatever, and they give you a gift, and they...it's over \$100, and then they have to tell you exactly how much that is worth. I don't think that you want that. And I see you're shaking your head. So I guess I'll listen to what else you have to say about your amendment. But just off the top of my head, I'm not certain that I would be supportive of this.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Schimek. Senator Beutler, there are no further lights on. Did you wish to close on your amendment, AM3254?

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Cudaback, members of the Legislature, as I indicated to you, the amendment has two parts, one that applies to the lobbyist-principal limitation of \$50, and the other that applies just to the financial statements. In neither case does it require you to ask for a statement of value. So with regard to your friend who gives you a gift, you simply
