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wouldn't ask for a statement of value, nor, as we discussed earlier with regard to the financial statement...it's probably not necessary anyway, since you could make a good-faith estimate of what the value is under the language of the statute. So...but I do believe that it has value for you, or it might have value for you, where you don't know what the value of the gift is. So I think what I'll do, since it is of a limited value with regard to financial statements but of some value in the other area, is withdraw the amendment and redraft it so it's more limited in scope, and see if that seems to be...see if that would be useful to people. And I'll talk to some of you about it. But this is just intended as a friendly amendment tool. But with that, I'll withdraw it at the moment, Mr. Clerk.

SENATOR CUDABACK: It is withdrawn. Mr. Clerk, next amendment.

CLERK: Mr. President. Now, Senator Beutler, I have AM3101, but a note, Senator, you'd like to offer as a substitute AM3227.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Seeing no objection, you're recognized to open, Senator Beutler. (AM3227, Legislative Journal page 1547.)

SENATOR BEUTLER: Yes. If you want to look on your committee amendment, the part that we're dealing with now is on page 6. And the part I'm principally interested in is on lines 4 and 5, which has to do with the gift of an admission to a state-owned facility or state-regulated industry or event, which may be given regardless of value. The part of the amendment that I consider most substantive is adding the language: may be given and accepted. Because there...if I'm thinking of this correctly, there are really two different parts to this. One is the giving and the other is the acceptance. And so that's the principal point of this amendment. And also to put in, for purposes of consistency, that the gift in this case is given by an agency, political subdivision, or publicly funded postsecondary educational institution. So that's what I'm trying to do and I would open it to discussion at this point on this amendment.

SENATOR CUDABACK: You heard the opening on the Beutler amendment to the committee amendments. Open for discussion. Senator Beutler, there are no lights on. Did you wish...Senator
