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national plan for distributing these organs based on the greatest need, or if they're going to be kept close to the location from which the organs derive, which means that people other than medical persons will determine where these organs are to be distributed. So now organs are being discussed like any other commodity and I'm sure those who have the money are going to be favored no matter what. But when it comes to persuading a person to sign away his or her organs, we have to realize how young somebody can be when they get a license. So I need to ask Senator Thompson, what is the age limit below which a person is not allowed legally to sign...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...away his or her organs? What is the...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Thompson, will you...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...age limit? How old do you have to be before you can legally do that?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Thompson, will you yield?

SENATOR THOMPSON: Yes. Nineteen.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Now, Senator Thompson, did you have it explained to you why they want to do away with one of these signings and witnessings?

SENATOR THOMPSON: It's, in their view, a duplication.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I'm not going to delay the bill at this time, but when we get to Select File I'm not in favor of just simplifying for the sake of people who work. These people at these motor vehicle places are paid. In the interests of simplification I'm not going to agree to anything that might hasten a person into making a decision that is not well-thought-out.
