SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...who wonder whether or not it might be convenient to have some people expire so that their organs can be harvested.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. As the agenda states, 11:15 we move on to bills previously not advancing. Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: Mr. President, next bill, LB 1101, a bill by Senator Aguilar. (Read title.) The bill was introduced on January 10, referred to the Health Committee, advanced to General File. Committee amendments have been adopted. Other amendments to the bill have been adopted. Senator Chambers, when we left the bill, LB 1101, you had filed a motion to indefinitely postpone. Senator Chambers, would like to withdraw his motion, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: It is withdrawn. No objection.
