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getting this system implemented, people have expressed enough frustration with whether it be CHARTS or whatever, that we ought not risk as the body responsible to the people, responsible for the children, to the parents, to the people we ought not risk for a purpose that is good and noble and well-motivated but, frankly, not necessary, not absolutely, unequivocally positive and constructive in this particular instance and, in fact, about which we cannot, at this point in time, be absolutely clear what its consequences will be, I don't think we should take this risk. And I'm saying risk, I'm not talking political risk, although I have said in meetings on this subject, if this system doesn't work, I don't think Dave Heineman is going to get all the calls, I don't think IV-D is going to get all the calls, I think legislators are going to get the calls. But I'm not talking about that kind of political risk. I'm talking about the risk to our sense of responsibility to see that this system gets up as best it can, and I just don't think we should saddle it with this additional obstacle and requirement that is not directly related, even thought it, in the abstract, its purposes are very worthwhile. I urge that we decline the Bourne amendment. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Brashear. Senator Hilgert, on the Bourne amendment.

SENATOR HILGERT: Thank you, Mr. President and members. I was fairly neutral on the Bourne amendment. In fact, when he introduced it, I was watching on television. I had kind of a sore throat deal going the other day and I was...first of all, I was thinking, well, why would we want, you know these jobs ought to be in Omaha. In fact, they ought to be in District 7, but some of the arguments against this amendment have struck me kind of funny. And I remember a news story that Dan Rather did some time ago with Warren Buffett, and he interviewed Warren Buffett in Omaha, and said, you know, why are you in Omaha, Nebraska? And Warren Buffett replied and said, I have all this money and I have imported all the equipment that would...that allows me to operate just as if I was on Wall Street itself, and he pointed to the phone. So the idea that you have to be in some physical proximity of the situation, it kind of pales. And it's almost laughable when senators bring up about the management. Well, they have to be close in order to manage them. Well, isn't it
