lawyers know the arguments you get into on child support. Some guy is working and he breaks his leg and he's going to be off the job for six weeks and he calls up and says, I'm sorry, I can't make my child support payments. What do you do? Or you have somebody who says, well, I got a better job offer in Cheyenne, Wyoming. It's going to take me two weeks to move, and I'm not going to get a paycheck, what do I do? How do I meet my child support payments? Or the wife calls up and...or the mother that has custody of the children calls up and said, well, I've been working but I've been laid off, or I'm sick, or the kids are sick. Things happen with families with children, and they have to be dealt with, and they affect child support. That's one reason I opposed this bill, because at the county level each county clerk takes care of this and each district judge can take care of it. Now we're going to do it out of one centralized office. It is both going to answer these questions, deal with the personal problems, and also deal with the disbursement of funds. And the right hand has to know what the left hand is doing. Now while I am very sympathetic to the idea and concept of creating jobs outstate, and I appreciate very much what Senator Bourne and Senator Smith and others have said, I think we have to look at a system and make sure it's going to work. Frankly, I don't know whether it will. I still have doubts. I'm reassured by the fact that our State Treasurer is going to bear this responsibility, but to be honest with you, if he's going to have that responsibility, I want to hold his feet to the fire and say it's your responsibility, you make sure it works. If we're going to hold his feet to the fire on this, then we're going to have to give him first-hand supervision and involvement with all phases of the problem. And that's not only disbursement, but that's dealing with people's problems, and has been pointed out so readily here what we're dealing with, really, is the support of children. And I don't think we should play games with it, I don't think we should prejudice the system. I hope I'm wrong. I swore last year that this system would never work. I really hope I'm wrong. And I think this Legislature has done a lot of hard work in trying to make this system work. I think it ought to be as streamlined as it can.
