whether Senator Chambers will get to those parts of the transcript. It might be interesting if he does. And I hope that if we do get to that portion of the discussion today that you all pay attention so that we're sure that the record is right about who did what and who didn't do what. But I would ask you to oppose the Chambers amendment.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Chambers, on your amendment.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, just leafing through this...this thick sheaf of papers, I do see where Senator Wickersham, on February 16, 1995, at page 1376, rose to say this: thank you, Madam President. I rise in support of Senator Jones' amendment. I didn't find what his amendment was. I was looking for your name. But, at any rate: as the amendment was beginning to be discussed and we were talking about how much and Senator Withem was talking about how much land is needed for one of these projects, I was harkening back to my high school days when I took geometry and I was beginning to wonder, quite frankly, a little bit about how many acres are in a 10-mile swath around a city that has a circumference, let's say, of 30 miles. And then you take a 10-mile strip outside of that and you have thousands of acres, thousands more than you would ever need. That's just a sample. I can kind of see why he didn't (laugh) get any of his amendments adopted. Nobody understood them except me, because Senator Wickersham was aiming at something with everything he said. And I'm getting the cart before the horse, but I wanted to let you know that I really do have the transcript. This is not just a sheaf of blank papers. But I want to work my way up to that, which I haven't done yet, and what I want to do, as I stated, before I get into reading from the transcript, is to offer some of these other amendments where I want to strike provisions from the bill, so that I will have a chance to discuss what those actual provisions are. Brothers and sisters, I even want to strike the name of the bill. They call it the Quality Jobs Act. Now, before I can embark on any of those discussions that I've mentioned already, I have got to define the terms so that it's clear what it is that I'm talking about and I don't want there to be any assumptions.
