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does is the blighted area outside the town that is set in the bill at 10 miles, mine would reduce that to 2 miles. I can see complications clear across the state because this bill does open it up to any city in the state. So that's the reason I would want to move that down to 2 miles. Thank you. Then here is what Senator Wickersham said, and it's going to make sense out of what he was saying earlier. Senator Wickersham: thank you, Madam President. I rise in support of Senator Jones' amendment. As the amendment was beginning to be discussed and we were talking about how much...and Senator Withem was talking about how much land is needed for one of these projects, I was harkening back to my high school days when I took geometry, and I was beginning to wonder, quite frankly, a little bit about how many acres are in a 10-mile swath around a city that has a circumference, let's say, of 30 miles, and then you take a 10-mile strip outside of that, and you have thousands of acres, thousands, more than you would ever need for probably 50 or 60 or some other multiple of Microns. So I began to wonder why was the number set at 10 miles. Is there something within 10 miles of some city that is specifically being targeted? I don't know. I don't have the foggiest idea where Micron might put its plant, but I know that there would be plenty of room within 2 miles of a number of cities that I can think of, plenty of room, plenty of places where you could find that the ground wasn't already covered with paving and sewer lines; plenty of places to put something like a manufacturing plant for computer chips, plenty of places to destroy the natural habitat, the natural beauty, the natural aspects of what we normally, in this body, try to preserve through parks, through incentives and other proposals but plenty of ground to find to cover with paving and buildings. You don't need to go out 10 miles. Two miles ought to be a great plenty and I think that Senator Jones has brought a good amendment. I'd like to ask Senator Jones a question.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Jones, would you yield to a question?

SENATOR JONES: Yes, I will.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Jones, so you support this amendment I've just been reading about here?

SENATOR JONES: That sounds like I should because I did not like
