agreed to do otherwise. Members of the Legislature, as I read this, some of it begins to give me a better understanding of what they were talking about at that time, but what they were talking about still did not constitute good policy and some of it still did not make a lot of sense but, nevertheless, Senator Schimek said: okay, I understand. Thank you. Senator Crosby: thank you, Senator Schimek. Senator Wesely, you said the bill...all right, Senator Maurstad. Any further discussion on the committee amendments?

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Seeing none, Senator Warner, would you like to close. He waives closing. The question is the adoption of the committee amendments to...oh, I was reading about LB 830, but they were going together anyway and it won't hurt you to get a little extra information. After LB 830, I guess we come to LB 829. But, anyway, that takes care of that portion of what I intend to read, and it doesn't really matter whether I was reading from LB 830 or LB 829 anyway.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Chambers, your light is next on the reconsideration motion.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Mr. President. I think I need to go on with this so I can figure out what in the world is going on here. So I think I will turn to Senator Withem: yes, Senator Crosby. Madam President and members of the body, stand to begin the explanation of LB 830. It's kind of interesting. Sometimes we come to the floor not terribly well prepared to make our arguments on bills because we haven't done our homework and don't have enough information. This is one where there is so much information floating around about I am not really sure what to include within my ten minutes. This bill, along with the other two that we have been designated early speaker priority bills for purposes of meeting a deadline are very important pieces of legislation, not just to this project, but I think for the overall economic future of our state. I'll say up front, very admittedly, that the impetus for these bills being before us in this form at this time and the need to move quickly is because Nebraska is one of three states that is being considered for an expansion project by Micron Technology.
