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where they're selling and Custer County has got a lot of farm ground and that's where they're not selling. And even the pasture in Custer County is a lot higher priced than the Sandhills. Custer County pasture is bringing about \$325 an acre right now. And they had this priced at \$400 an acre. So that was way too high and the people never even showed up that wanted to buy it. So my legislative district has got over a half a million acres of school ground, and the people are concerned up there. They want to start selling it so that they could get it back on the tax rolls so that they can pay for a lot of the roads and repairs and fire districts. So I was in the meeting with Rex Holsapple yesterday, too. And it looked like it said that they had extra duties at the wrong time. Well, he's got to make a decision after they finally get a bid on it. So I don't know how he could do that, make a decision afterwards and still say yes or no on the sale. So I think it just puts another layer in there so I don't think this amendment is needed. I guess we need to vote it down and go on with the bill. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Jones. Senator Baker, on the Kristensen amendment. Senator Baker. Is Senator Baker available? Senator Baker waives off. Senator Chambers, your light is next after Senator Baker.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I'd like to ask Senator Bromm a question if I may, because I was occupied while he was talking, but I heard my name mentioned and I want to find out if it was taken in vain...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Bromm.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...or just how and in what context it was used. Senator Bromm.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Bromm.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Were you saying that you don't agree with your amendment anymore that you had us adopt yesterday?

SENATOR BROMM: (Laugh) Oh, no.
