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tell the one who's making these kind of sales...you've got this used car lot, and he's selling a "Rattle-ac" for more than what it would cost to buy a brand-new Cadillac, and you're going to say, we don't want you selling cars like that anymore because you're getting too much for these rattle traps? That wouldn't work anywhere but here. I think Senator Kristensen's amendment is...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...what we ought to adopt.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Baker on the Kristensen amendment.

SENATOR BAKER: If I can get...thank you, Senator Cudaback, members. If I can get Senator Chambers to listen to this, he just made my case for this bill. Senator Jones said, that man would have paid \$413 had that land been run up that high in price. What happened? It never got started. Senator Chambers, you're not listening. If...he said, yes, he'd have probably...it was right beside him, he wouldn't have let it get away from him. He'd have paid \$450 an acre maybe. I don't know. The point is, it never got started. You're talking about public auctions here. Land doesn't change hands very often out in our country. It's a final sale usually for two or three generations. You made my case. We need to get a legitimate starting point on this land. And it will bring way more than the starting price, generally. And my bill still allows the Ted Turners to be forced to pay more than that. If you look at the bill, it says, appraised value or higher value. And this is directed toward Senator Kristensen. The board still has the right to determine whether or not to offer the tract of land. That's on page 4 of the AM7248. They have 60 days after receipt of an application to have it sold, they have 60 days to determine whether or not it will even be sold. That's a big concession in this bill. They still have control of it. What we're trying to do is just what you pointed out needed to be done. This man would have paid \$413 an acre if he had been run up that high. The point is, it was never started. Because obviously, people try and buy land for what...as little as they can. But you have to have a legitimate starting price. And
