This amendment asks for consideration for...I mean, the inclusion for labeling in excess of 25 percent, so that the gasoline would be in excess of 25 percent containing aromatic hydrocarbons. And with that, I would yield some time to Senator Schrock if he would...no. Okay. I'd be glad to answer some questions about this, because this is a new issue that has come up since the time that we adopted the Preister amendment about MTBE. And the elements that are included on the list of what is added to gasoline I think are...they are serious enough that we really need to consider whether in protecting individuals that we give them the opportunity to know that by being able to look at the label. SENATOR CUDABACK PRESIDING

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Brown. You've heard the opening on the AM3313, the Brown amendment. Senator Schmitt for discussion.

SENATOR SCHMITT: Yes, Mr. President. I just got one question for Senator Brown, on...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Brown, do you yield, please?

SENATOR SCHMITT: ...if you're looking at the gadget there, on that number two there, where it says to insert the underscoring in Section 1 through 5. What does that do? It's on the second page.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Brown. Senator Brown.

SENATOR BROWN: Okay. This...it's all...we'll just talk a little bit more about aromatic hydrocarbons while we are determining this. Aromatic hydrocarbons are chemicals that are added to gasoline that increase the octane level, but also have potential side effects...harmful side effects. And I guess Senator Schmitt is ready to pose the question again to me.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Schmitt.

SENATOR SCHMITT: I had the question answered back here. So
