building where they are uttered, because it is a show and an act. If we care about children, we would care about all children. And I did take personal offense at what the Governor did, because I do care about children, everybody's children, even his child. And what he did was grossly unfair, inappropriate and inexcusable. And I believe, since he did what he did publicly, it is necessary for me to do and say publicly, as I have done and as I have spoken.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Landis, on the motion to return.

SENATOR LANDIS: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Members of the Legislature, it's always a close question as to whether or not, when you hear a colleague make an argument or a point of view that you do not share, as to whether you engage in that debate or just sit still. My purpose is not to dispute Senator Chambers but it is to disassociate myself and to say I see things almost completely differently, almost completely differently. The place where I do see things the same is that every child is precious. There's a place where I would agree with Senator Chambers. And, by the way, all of our children are precious, all of the Supreme Court Justice's children are precious, Warren Buffett's children are precious. It extends on all of the axes, including the powerful and the unpowerful, the wealthy and the unwealthy as well, every child is precious. And I don't see this as exploitation. I do see this as having been drawn into a...a publicly accountable situation because of a police call and then the desire to simply tell the truth and own up to that. I find it admirable, I happen to find it appropriate, I happen to find it acknowledging the reality of the intrusive nature of the press in these situations. And my purpose is not to disagree with Senator Chambers, to argue him out of his perceptions, but simply to declare my own as being very different and that I, rather than most situations where I remain silent when I hear things I disagree with, I just thought I'd want to make clear what my own perceptions are. I give the rest of my time to Senator Wickersham.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Wickersham.

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Mr. President, I agree with the comments of
