Wickersham amendment. That's yea to the Wickersham amendment.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Landis. Senator Wickersham, you're recognized to close on your amendment.

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Mr. President, I would...since there did not appear to be questions about the amendment, I would simply ask you to vote aye (pronounced I) or aye (pronounced A).

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: The question is, shall the Wickersham amendment be adopted? Those in favor vote aye, those opposed nay. Mr. Clerk, please record.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on AM3336.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: The amendment is agreed to. Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: Senator Wickersham, AM3333 (sic).

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Wickersham, you're recognized to open.

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: I'm sorry, Mr. Clerk. That isn't the order I have on my...

CLERK: Senator, I'm sorry, AM3334. (Legislative Journal page 1640.)

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Wickersham, you're recognized to open on AM3334.

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Okay. Are we...okay. Thank you, Mr. President. I'm sorry. We could have done either one, but I don't want...really didn't wish the members to be confused about which one, since we had a variance from our devices. The issue that is raised by AM33...the board is wrong. What are we...okay. The issue that is raised by AM3334 is kind of a technical one. Okay. And it is the beginning of the...it is the issue that Senator Landis said that had to do with nondiscrimination in these kinds of programs. Senator Landis indicated that the amendment, AM3330, contains nondiscrimination language. It does. The nondiscrimination language that was
