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that product was found, in Europe, in some meat that was contaminated with it that came to the United States, supposedly. We don't have country of origin labeling, we can't tell exactly where it came from; it was in an IBP product that went to Europe and they found traces of DES in that stuff. That's...that's a very potent hormone that can cause serious difficulties in humans if they ingest it. Now, these are the kinds of things we have to stop, and this is the reason for the bill. I should tell you also that there are...this...the exact wording in this legislation is what is in the federal legislation that requires us to come into compliance. And we have to do this in order to comply with the AMDUCA rule in the FDA, Food and Drug Administration. So, this language is no different than what's been passed in 18 other states to this point. And they will be passed in all the states in the nation, eventually. So what we're trying to do is prevent indiscriminate use of hormones and...in the part of the public, and that's exactly what this does. It doesn't prevent any farmer or any rancher from buying the products he normally buys over the counter. It just says that those prescription items have to be signed by a veterinarian who is involved with a veterinarian-client-patient relationship. He knows that herd, he works for that herd owner...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR DIERKS: ...and they have this relationship.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay. So, if I'm understanding correctly what you're saying, Senator, the answer is, yes, you're not changing subsections (5) and (6) of the existing law at all.

SENATOR DIERKS: No, I'm...

SENATOR BEUTLER: It's not intended to affect that.

SENATOR DIERKS: Yeah. I hope that's correct, I haven't...I don't have that language right in front of me, but I think that what I've told you is what's happening.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay.
