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SENATOR TYSON: Yes. I have a question for Senator Schimek.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Schimek, would you yield?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes, I will.

SENATOR TYSON: Senator Schimek, the...going to the top of page 2, it said: gifts shall not include campaign contribution, et cetera, et cetera, or a gift received from a relative. Then Section 4, which follows immediately, has a list of spouse, father, mother, et cetera, or any lineal descendant legally adopted or as such in conformity with the laws of the state where adopted...any, all these are new subjects now, any person to whom an individual for not less than ten years prior to receipt of a gift or loan has stood in the acknowledged relation of a parent or spouse, separate subject. Now, my first wedding anniversary is April 16th, and I was hoping that Marge would spring big, but we've only been married one year, not ten. Now, your answer doesn't...I mean I'm going to...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Spouse...

SENATOR TYSON: ...against this nonsense anyway, but I was wondering, if this becomes law, that's cut out?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: No, no.

SENATOR TYSON: That's what it says here.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: It's your spouse, if she gives you a gift, that is not...you do not have to report that. I think what that ten year language is trying to cover is common law kind of situations, or domestic kinds of situations where maybe a child has lived with a person for ten years and has never been legally adopted, that kind of thing, so they are exempted.

SENATOR TYSON: Well, this language is murky, which is the reason I bring it...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: I appreciate it.

SENATOR TYSON: I mean, if you look at the construction of the
