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rather long sentence, those commas indicate new subjects in each case as part of the definition. Any state where adopted, comma, new subject, any person to whom an individual is not for less than ten years prior to receipt of a gift or loan has stood in the acknowledged relationship of a parent or spouse.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Senator, may I ask a question then?

SENATOR TYSON: Sure.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Are you interpreting all of those people to come under the ten year provision? Is that what you're interpreting here?

SENATOR TYSON: No, the...I'm...I'm starting at the comma.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Which comma?

SENATOR TYSON: The one after "adopted" on line 12.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Okay.

SENATOR TYSON: The balance of line 12, all of line 13, all of line 14, and "or spouse" of line 15 is one subject...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Right.

SENATOR TYSON: ...and, as such, is distinct from the other subjects mentioned, which is why it is set out.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Right, right. And what's your question then?

SENATOR TYSON: My...my question says this obviates any...in other words, any gift of \$50 or more, and I mean I don't know what I'm, you know, I'm hoping that it's \$50 or more, but all of this is included in that definition as a separate subject.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: No, there's a...as a separate subject, yes.

SENATOR TYSON: Yeah.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: It's a separate subject.
