Senator Beutler is proposing to you. I...I, frankly, do wish that we had not adopted the last amendment. I don't know what we'll do about that. I think Senator Coordsen hit the right tone for this discussion in a little bit. We can put in laws...put in place laws that make us look as unctuous and as holy and as pure and wonderful as we could ever imagine them. We could make breathing free air a crime, but that wouldn't change anything. It wouldn't change anything. And I don't think, quite frankly, it's going to change much in the way of public perception, because the public doesn't read these laws. They're not...they're not overly concerned, I don't think, whether or not there are these kinds of restrictions in statutes. They're more concerned about appearances and the appearances are what you and I do on a day-to-day basis. It is our day-to-day behavior that means far more to me than these laws, these rules, these restrictions which can trouble us, can trouble our families, can trouble the people that we do business with on a day-to-day basis and think that we're being human beings, think that we're behaving like everybody else around us. But when we put this web of rules and restrictions around us, we no longer become human beings that are treated like everybody else, for most purposes, and at that point I think we create a different kind of a public perception and a perception that is very negative. We are like them. We are citizens of the state of Nebraska and it is our behavior, the standards that we apply to ourselves from a day-to-day basis, that I think are far more important than all the words that we could ever put in a statute.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: They won't make us into...those words that are put into statutes will not make us into good persons in everybody's light. We just simply can't do it. And I...and I do not think we should adopt Senator Beutler's amendment. I don't think it's a good amendment. And, normally, I think someone would rise up and say, this is such a significant change that it shouldn't have been done without a committee hearing and discussion. We just can't figure out today on the floor what the ramifications I think are of what Senator Beutler is proposing. I don't see why we should spend time doing it. I think we have other things to do.
