Therefore, only...only public officials at the state level would be covered, but all state level public officials would be covered. I would urge the adoption of the amendment. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Brashear. Senator Kristensen, on the Brashear amendment.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Thank you, Mr. President, members of the Legislature. Senator Brashear, just want to...I'm not saying I'm opposed. I'm just trying to ferret out some questions here because it has been said, almost every speaker today, there is a lot of difficult language in this section of the law. If...if...let's use your example of admission tickets and if someone doesn't want a set of season tickets but wants four tickets to an individual game. Is that prohibited? Because it is more than an admission for the recipient and one guest, but obviously would be less than two season tickets.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: That is not prohibited, Senator Kristensen. Two would be of no consequence because that's the individual and the guest.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Right.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: And two would be gifts of the four. Declining the season tickets wouldn't get you any special treatment as it relates to the four.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: All right. So if you wanted...well, in that case, two tickets would be in excess of \$50 and so you couldn't do that. The first two are okay. The second two would not be okay because they would be in excess of \$50. That's my reading of it. Is that...is that your understanding of it?

SENATOR BRASHEAR: If it came from a lobbyist or a principal, yes.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Well, no, if it came from...I'm not worried about the lobbyist and principal. I'm worried about the state-owned facility or state-sponsored industry that would do this.
