SENATOR BRASHEAR: Well, the two...the third and fourth ticket are a gift and are reportable.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Okay.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: And they are subject to the limitation on gifts.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Okay, so they...they would not be because (inaudible)?

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Depending on their price.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Well, let's just say that you've got...both of them are \$30, because there are two of them, that's a \$60, and so...

SENATOR BRASHEAR: One, one would be permissible. Ticket three would be permissible; ticket four would not.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Okay. And that's the...that's what I'm trying to sort out here as to how difficult some of this can be because, obviously, you could get one set of season tickets and not have a worry, but if you wanted to go to one game and take another couple with you and you didn't want to do a season ticket, you couldn't do it under that language. That's what I'm trying to...that's what I'm trying to decipher, not so much as whether I want to do that or not, but I want to make sure that we try to cover this whole range of what actually practically happens sometimes with people. The other issue that I just want to make sure I understand is if the Regents get a single set, if they get a ticket and one for their guest, that's not reportable. Is that correct?

SENATOR BRASHEAR: That is correct.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: But if a...
