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things. We didn't put those in the statute, but there was discussion that was there that the purpose of the homestead was to assist people in making their home, through the use of not paying their property tax, that extra money that they would save would be used to modify their homes and to make them so they could get around and do things. Homestead now has evolved to where people say, well, this is a property tax relief for certain homeowners. And so there's always a struggle. Senator Bourne, there's also a provision in there that talks about the value of the house. At one point in time we had people who had \$300,000 homes who were eligible for homestead relief. And the discussion in the Revenue Committee at that time was, well, if you can have a \$300,000 home, you certainly shouldn't...you've got enough money, you ought to be able to do something else. So we changed and we factored in, took into account local valuations and so on. But there is a lot of people who think that homestead now has become an assistance program. It's a property tax program to reduce property tax for people, and it's just a way to target certain people. So there are some people who think homestead is geared solely for lower income people, some think it's geared for those that are of certain ages, and there's...and you'll see a variety of these bills come in and out. The only observation I have is I don't necessarily read it the way that, Senator Bohlke, that the people you quoted read that. I read that section differently so that it is a disability or loss of mobility, and then you start reading "such as", and you read those two together. But...and I think that matches what my historical perspective of it is. If we believe that it needs to be changed, obviously, that's where we're at in the Legislature and that's the reason we're here, is to make those changes. But if you would allow them to be split, in other words the definition to be a permanent disability as an (a), and then or (b) or if they have loss of mobility, the problem I have with definition becomes what is the permanent disability? It isn't total disability. Is it a Social Security test? I don't know. That strays from what I think the original intent of the bill was to do some years ago, was to provide relief so people could take that money and modify their home so they could get around. It was sort of an attempt, also, to deal with the ADA and those sorts of things. But I'm going to support the Wickersham amendment. I assume that we'll come back and visit this. If we don't do this, there will be a tax and
