to do so. But I think...well, my time is up; I'll turn on my light again.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Wickersham, on the Bourne amendment.

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, whatever Senator Chambers may be able to convince you about the state of the law or even what you think maybe the state of the law ought to be, you'll need to come back to the amendment that is proposed, and I hope you do defeat Senator Bourne's amendment. I don't...and again I will reiterate, I don't know how much it would mean in terms of cost, if we were to extend the homestead exemption to all persons with "a permanent physical disability". We don't, and again to reiterate some of the discussion we've already heard, having lost one eye would be a form of a permanent physical disability. Maybe having a toe amputated is a permanent physical disability. Think of all the things that you might wish or consider to be, ah, how would you do that? Senator Bromm has a missing ring finger on his right...left hand, however that happened to him. I don't know whether that's a permanent physical disability, but what...glasses. Are eye glasses a permanent physical disability? If I take mine off, I'm somewhat at a disadvantage anyway. And I don't want to make these into kind of trivial kinds of issues for you, but I do hope you understand that, if we adopt what Senator Bourne is suggesting is the appropriate definition, what Senator Chambers is arguing for is the appropriate definition, there is no definition. And I doubt that we can do that. And aside from not knowing what that constitutes, what a permanent physical disability constitutes, we would have really no reasonable way to estimate for you what the fiscal impact is going to be, but it would have to be in the millions of dollars, I can't imagine it would not be in the millions of dollars. Now, if we do what I'm suggesting in AM3361, without Senator Bourne's amendment, the law will be what...clearly be, the law will clearly be what I think this Legislature thought it was when they passed Senator Preister's bill a year ago. We didn't suggest to you, members of the Revenue Committee didn't suggest to you, I didn't suggest to you, Senator Preister didn't suggest to you, no one suggested to you that we were making a substantial expansion of the homestead
