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as the court do. And if you don't know what your responsibilities are, I as a judge know what mine are. And if you forsake yours, I am not going to forsake mine. And the Legislature tried to give authority, which the constitution gave to the Legislature alone, to some other individual or agency, and that cannot be done. We're not talking about authority of a legislative nature inappropriately granted to the Department of Revenue. We're talking about a usurpation of legislative authority by an agency. That's what I'm talking about. Twenty-five votes can do anything on this floor, other than override vetoes and certain other things, can do anything on this floor that that many people want to do. I'm saying that this is a policy discussion that people are engaging in, but it's after the fact. It's an attempt to justify an inappropriate action by the Revenue Department. Just admit that you blundered and that you didn't pay attention; you let something get by you, and now you want to correct it. But don't try to make me read words and give them a meaning that they don't have based on the way they are structured into a sentence. I know how to read a sentence. I know the difference between a conjunction and a disjunction.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: At this point, people can decide how they're going to vote. But if the law means what Senator Wickersham and others have told us that it means, there is no need to insert the word "and" and strike the two words "or who". If the two words "or who" really mean "and", there is no reason to change this aspect of the law. Let that come in as a bill so that we can argue it and the policy that underlies it. But Senator Wickersham can sit over there contented and confident because I think he has put the fear of God and Wickersham into all of you, and he has told you it's going to cost some money. The "Wizard" is called a "Wizard" for a reason. Mr. "Wizard", I must bow to your ability today; I believe you have won.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Chambers. (Visitors introduced.) Debate on the Bourne amendment? Senator Bohlke.
