Senator Bohlke and others, that to take...and the way the amendment is drafted, which we're still waiting for, but getting close, is to take \$2 million from this fund. And that would leave \$865,246 still in that fund. The way we will have to do it is to transfer the money from this Hardship Cash Fund to General Fund, and then, via Senator Bohlke's amendment, to transfer that money from the General Fund to the reunification fund. And as I would understand it, and I think Senator Bohlke will agree with me, that if we were to do this, that money going into that cash fund would be all that there is. It would not be an ongoing commitment, unless a future legislative body decided to add to that or to continue it. And it would be the intent to add two years, per her amendment, to the reunification fund, to keep that open for two more years. And I know she wasn't able to hear everything I said, but that is the way I understand it, and I believe Senator Bohlke would agree with me on that, if she wants to make her own comments. The cash fund originally came from some money we appropriated to the Hardship Fund, Hardship Cash Fund in 1999, and it's been unused at this point. It was General Funds originally, going into the cash fund. Yes. And that money has been sitting there unused at this point. I offer this as an option. I am not married to this, but it is...since it was suggested to me, I thought I would bring it in. I do apologize for it being somewhat belated, but I believe it is a viable option, and it should not increase General Fund expenditures, or any kind of an ongoing situation. It simply takes some unused cash funds, has to funnel through the General Fund, and then go into another cash fund, which will be used until it's gone. And I don't know whether you...at this time, Senator Bohlke, I don't know whether you have any comments you'd like to make, or you can make them on your own.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Bohlke.

SENATOR BOHLKE: Thank you, Senator Wehrbein. Just, again, thank you for an idea that I hadn't thought of that I think solves the problem. It solves the problem for schools, and certainly allows those schools...it's very important to a number of these schools who have gone through all kinds of meetings with the public, and have gone through all the emotions that it takes for communities to consider moving in this direction. And without this, I think they would have felt the rug was pulled
