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second and third year at the rate that you thought. In fact, I don't know how much it would actually be, what percentage. But I think that's a commitment we need to keep. I can justify by...doing it, by the fact that we're moving what we considered hardship funds, school funds, over to this unification-merger process funding. So it's not like we're pulling this out of the clear blue sky to move it from school fund to something totally un...totally different, anyway. And also, as I pointed out the first time I spoke, the efficiencies are being created in these districts. I know they cut some administration the first year. They're cutting some more administration the second year. And I know they're ridding four and a half positions. I believe they have at least that many teachers that are retiring, moving on, natural attrition. So the first year may be expensive. The second year it looks like they're at least going to break even or save some money. And I would guess the third year they're going to save a considerable amount of money. The discussion as to whether the school districts are doing this to get the sparse category designation...I can speak from personal knowledge that the Trenton and Stratton districts that unified were both sparse already. It did not change their classification. Culbertson, the third district that went in with that unification, I don't know whether they were sparse or standard. I really don't know. Of course, if they were standard and they are now in sparse. But at least the two I know were already sparse. The two others that are working together out in my area are Cambridge and Twin Valley. They are both sparse districts already. It would have no bearing on them. The other question we had was, what other mergers have we had out in my area? We have had the Wauneta-Palisade merger. They simply consolidated. That wasn't a unification. So we are getting the job done out there. And I feel very comfortable with moving the money from the Hardship Fund over to the Incentive Fund. It's all going to the schools, and have no problem with doing that. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Baker. Senator Suttle, on the motion to return.
