access it, and it's already there. And it's not accessed the same amount every year like a previous bill we discussed for hours on end, addressed. I think it's a terrible habit, too, for those that are addicted, and we have to provide what help and assistance we can for them. And so even though I think it was a terrible thing, indeed, that we didn't give charitable gaming a chance, a terrible thing, indeed. I'm not sure why we voted the way we did, I'm not sure why some of you maybe pulled off and some of you didn't, but on the other hand, the problems still exist. As long as we have the gambling across the river, the problem will continue to exist, and so I think accessing this funds, this amount of money, is important. I want to thank Senator Smith, too, for voting and supporting our charitable gaming bill, and he did that in good faith, and did it, I am sure, because his amendment was part of the bill. It was a legitimate and a reasonable part of this problem and should continue to be, and all I would like to say is that this isn't the last we'll see of this sort of thing. And as long as those institutions exist across the river, they will find more suckers that they can buy off to try to get to you with names of organizations that might not even exist to convince you about how terrible these things are. But it's like so many things we get through the mail or we get passed out, they go around the edges of the truth but they don't really want to talk about the truth at all. I didn't have time to tear all of these apart. I didn't want to waste your time either. I just hope you're not so gullible that you believe everything you see or read, almost said newspapers, but I didn't want to say that. So I didn't say that, you know that. Because I think people that write for the newspapers, in most cases, leave the truth. By the way, Nancy Hicks never did talk to me. I just saw a copy of the thing she had. I never read it either, and she quoted Senator Jensen, but I noticed I wasn't quoted, and I wasn't asked. In fact, I don't think I have ever been...ever been interviewed by Nancy for anything on any issue or for any reason. So it, you know, it appears in some cases articles come out where they are probably biased towards the reporter's point of view. This is an issue that won't go away. As long as gambling...as long as gambling is just across the river, we have to continue to address the issue. We wouldn't even give the Indians a chance to allow people to vote on the issue as it applied to them. That's how bad...that's how bad some of our attitudes are, and I can't help
