got to do something about it. So we introduce all sorts of limitations. Before you do that look at the size and the scope of the things you're going to vote on today with some eye to the bottom line and some eye towards the restraint, because only you and only I are going to have to respond to these. In particular, Senator Wickersham's bill, I did not vote for it on Final Reading, at no surprise to him I won't vote to support the override. A year ago we had a debate on an amendment about what should we do...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: ...with state aid, is it an entitlement, do we recertify those things? I view this as it isn't putting into place anything new and towards an entitlement, but it is putting one more reason when you some day are going to find us with short revenues down the line and you're going to have to choose between the state programs. As Senator Beutler said, what is your first obligation? Is it to the state and the state obligations and the state run things that we're primarily responsible for, or is it the local government? Tough choice. We'll put it off until we have to make that decision, but when you make that decision here's the speech that's going to happen. We have made a commitment to education. We have passed LB 1107, which promised the people and they relied on 47 percent. We have passed and voted on a formula to state aid for schools...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: ...that said we're going to provide this amount of money. You're going to have a very tough time of voting against those things to get what you ultimately want to get, and that is to spend the money on the state priorities first. That's the reason I'm not going to vote for it today. It's just one more of those entitlement issues. I would hope that you would keep in mind, as we go through this afternoon, that ultimately you're going to be answerable. I don't expect everybody to say "no" to everything.
