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works at the co-op, the fellow that works at the drug store--you know, you see a wide range of people. Those people all live in a home or on a farm. They all pay property tax. Even if they're renting an apartment, they theoretically pay that property tax on that building. You ask them what...what the sales tax rate is in the state of Nebraska. Maybe one out of ten will know what that sales tax rate is. You ask them how many dollars in sales tax they pay during the year. They have no idea. You ask them what their income tax was. Other than this particular time of the year, they probably don't know exactly what it was. But you ask them...you ask them what their property tax is. Except for the person that rents that apartment, he doesn't realize that it's built into his rent, you ask them what their property tax is and they can almost tell you to the penny what their property tax is on their property. If someone is...this is something my dad told me a long time ago and I was complaining about paying my income tax. He said, son, let me tell you something, consider paying income tax a privilege. At least you made some money. He said, it's a lot better to pay income tax than not to pay it, because if you aren't paying income tax things aren't going to be very good for your family. And he was right. Sure, I complain about paying income tax, we all do, but you're fortunate if you do pay income tax because that means you're making some money. We have people who are not making a living now in our rural area, they are not making a living, but they are still paying their property tax, either that or they lose their property. I'm going to...I'm going to support the override. I don't know if I'm going to support any of the other ones, but I certainly am this one. Senator Wickersham, what you're saying is absolutely correct. Somewhere along the line we have to say we are going to dedicate a certain percentage to state aid to education. If it means sales tax increases or income tax increases that's the way it's probably going to have to be. Because with the rural economy right now and not only the rural economy but the homes that people are paying taxes on right now, it...it's getting to the point where you wonder if someone is going to say, I've had enough, I've had enough of paying property taxes. That is the one major thing I hear from 90 percent of my...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.
