off in two directions because we're talking about two distinct situations. We're talking about the juvenile court situation in Douglas County and we're talking about the 11th Judicial District for district judges, and I'd like to focus a bit of attention on the district judgeship. Senator Beutler had asked a question about an order that was issued by a district judge in the 11th Judicial District concerning domestic relations cases, and I don't have the letter in front of me, Senator Beutler. I'll give you the best of my recollection as to what happened. After the Legislature passed the authority for the county court to handle certain phases of domestic relations cases, the matter was presented by District Judge Murphy, who sent a letter to the practitioners in the 11th District questioning the constitutionality of that and questioning the jurisdictional authority of...of this authority being given to the...to the county court judges. And subsequent to that, and it isn't by order, I mean he couldn't order the county judges to do anything or the...certainly not the attorneys, but when you raise a question concerning authority and whether something would be considered improper from the standpoint of whether there was authority granted that was appropriate, people got chilled off from the idea of using the county court, which is pretty obvious that you would feel that way. So the status of it was that no one has really challenged that and has gone forward with it. I think it could happen but, like any...like any prudent people, if you have the opportunity to have the district judge handle it, not having any question about it, or have a county court handle it and then having a question at a later time about whether there was authority to do it, you would pick the district judge, and that's what's happened. One of the other phases that...of this situation that is difficult in Lincoln County, primarily, is that we have Lexington over here that's not served, we have North Platte that is served with two judges and what would happen...they really would like to have a resident judge in Lexington. And part of the time that is taken in these matters is the traveling back and forth between North Platte and Lexington. So I think as we...as we move forward and through the years it's going to take place that judges are not going to be able to be in one place. The Supreme Court, under new appointments, will dictate where these people live and I think that the areas will be better served. We have the same problem up in the northwest part of the state where we have
