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out what kind of interest there is in the industry as far as...I'm for value-added, I think it's important. I think the issue you talked about, the issue of being able to use buffalo and get them in the market because they're being produced now, and so that sounds like a viable direction to go. I guess, I'm willing to sit back at this point and see what kind of a study is done and how, in fact, it will affect whether we want to move ahead on this program. I guess, you would...you indicated that was your direction, too, right now, to see what the...what the interest is in the people out there who are willing to produce. With the new value-added legislation that we introduced this year there's going to be the necessity for some kind of inspection, whether it's federal, whether it's state. And I guess as we move ahead in this process we'll see what...see what develops. So I'm not...I'm not very supportive of adding anymore money for something that's not necessary, but we need to determine that and, I guess, that will be determined once we do the study. So, with that, thank you for your responses and I'll...

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: One minute.

SENATOR VRTISKA: ...terminate my discussion. Thank you.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Stuhr.

SENATOR STUHR: Thank you, Mr. Speaker and members of the Legislature. I'm rising in support of the override of this veto, because I believe that this study is actually very important to the state of Nebraska. It's important for us to be able to compete with the other states. If you look at that first picture or handout that Senator Robak handed out, and Nebraska looks like an island among themselves. I think it's also very important that we look at...I know as a homemaker that many homemakers look at or would like to see that point of origin--where does our meat come from? I think it would be a great boon for Nebraska if we knew that we were actually buying Nebraska beef when people shop at the grocery stores, or whether it is beef or buffalo or whatever. So I am going to support this override and hope that you will, too. Thank you.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Lynch.
