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your own, not a problem that exists in Tennessee, or a problem that exists in Washington State, or Delaware, anything else. This is Nebraska.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR COORDSEN: We have probably the most accurate and, matter of fact, overreporting of campaign expenses, to a large extent, the overreporting on financial disclosure statements, simply because we have such an open system, and the individuals that are willing to participate in that system cannot be individuals who are predisposed to be scurrilous or bent on doing things in a manner that is personal beneficial to themselves. I'm still...the bill is in the same shape that I hoped it would be. It has nothing hidden in it, no set of words that came out in a manner, I think, that are differently than what was intended. But you still have to ask your question, on this final day...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Time.

SENATOR COORDSEN: ...of the biennial session, is this something we need to do? Thank you.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Coordsen. Senator Lynch, followed by Senators Beutler, Schimek, and Chambers. Senator Lynch.

SENATOR LYNCH: Okay, I think it's on now. Thank you very much. You know, I've been in office for quite a while now, and I've been in politics for a long time. And it's changed a lot. I can remember in the old days of the Douglas County Board, when we had one Republican on the board. And most of us, who were...all the rest of us, who were Democrats, tried to help him keep in office, because he was a good guy, and he was an honest and honorable man. And we helped him. And we even got heck from some of our Democratic friends for doing that. And it used to be that we went out of our way not to hurt anybody. It used to be, if you couldn't say something good about somebody, you shouldn't say anything at all. And times have sure changed. Because nowadays, it seems that if you can't say something bad about somebody, you don't say anything at all. And I think
