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that's too bad. And if we wonder why people are turned off with the system and with politics, and you wonder why young people don't want to serve, you can certainly see why. All you got to do is read the newspapers or listen to the news, and there will be some one of us, maybe not too much in this Legislature, but others, who go out of their way to fight, to argue publicly, to say something bad. And whether it's politics or just in life in general, that's terrible, and we shouldn't do that. You know, as you know, I've never... I haven't voted once for an amendment or for the bill. My good liberal friend Senator Tyson, I think, have been with each other on this one all the way along. So politics does make some strange bedfellows sometimes. But on the other hand, I think we're both right. What's to prove with this kind of legislation? It isn't necessary. And the way it's written implies that there is. And I just want the kids and everybody else to know in the audience that might be listening to this that there isn't. If there's a crook among us, they should be convicted and sent out of here. The only senator I can ever remember who had to leave this Legislature because of that kind of activity did it before he became a state senator, and he went to jail, as he should. All I can say is, who do we answer to? Who promotes this? Why was it promoted? And those questions have never been answered. The only answer was, well, there's a perception. Well, when you change the law because you think there's a perception of dishonesty, then you admit to the fact that it probably is true. And I tell you that it's not true. And it's wrong. I only saw one person in the balcony that day we were debating this issue. It must be a powerful man. I have never, I don't think, in the last 20 years or so, had anybody ever tell me, we need, above all things, we need, above all things, campaign reform, and above all things, we got to make sure that things are done honestly and appropriately. Nobody ever told us how to do it. But I don't remember since that. I remember the 20 year, because it was 20 years ago. And I remember the person that told me, and the person who told me was the last person that offered me a bribe before I went to jail (sic.) All I can tell you is, ladies and gentlemen, this is the wrong thing to do at the wrong time. What we ought to be doing is talking more about encouraging young people to get involved in politics. And if they could afford it, they would run for the Legislature, but of course, they can't, because they can't afford to serve. That's why there's so many old people
