...serving on the Natural Resources Committee. Now, you undertook your responsibilities as Chair of Education at a time that became increasingly difficult for public schools in the state of Nebraska. Some of those difficulties culminated with the passage of LB 806 and LB 806A, easily one of the most controversial bills to go through this Legislature. I think it still holds, those two bills combined, I think, still hold the record for debate for passage of any piece of legislation and, of course, in some senses we haven't even stopped debating them yet, and I don't think we're going to because it's fundamental to the well-being of the state. But you passed other bills. You had... I don't know whether it was the folly or the good will toward a Governor to introduce three bills on behalf of a Governor. At least one of them passed and that was welfare reform, another very, very significant piece of legislation. But for the rest of you, even though I'm reciting bills that Senator Bohlke sponsored and had certainly helped to pass, when I ask her what she thought the most significant piece of legislation she had passed was she didn't give me an answer. She said that she thought that what she had done that was the most significant was constituent service, not a bill; that somehow she had helped people that she represented. Well, Ardyce, I think that's the way we should do this business--pass the important bills when we need to, make good policy for the state of Nebraska, and serve our constituents. That's the way we should do it. Now, if any of you think that after we finish today that somehow we're done with Senator Bohlke, I don't think that's going to be the case. My summer schedule is already being filled up by Senator Bohlke. She has me going to Madison, Wisconsin, for three days to a conference about teacher pay. I know there's going to be hearings across the state on that issue. That is likely to be one of the most important issues that we're going to address in the Legislature next session, but what we do over the summer is going to start to set that debate. We're going to be sorry you're not going to be here to finish it, but, maybe like Senator Crosby, you're going to be kind of waiting in the wings and prodding us along when it doesn't go quite the way you think it should. And I know that we're going to have more tours of schools. My guess is, Senator Bohlke, that you aren't going to be able to leave schools alone. And my guess is you really aren't going to be able to leave us alone either, and I'm looking forward to that. But I'm also looking
