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that I wanted to thank, I look up and kind of lose track of who I recognize and I forgot some people who were extremely important to all of us, and that is the Legislative Research Office, those researchers, those librarians and those people who help us with program evaluation and who provide us with so much information, and that's not...that was a total error of omission and I hope that we all can thank them appropriately at this time. (Applause) This is a point in a session where we all tend to remember the last days and the last hours of serving. We've all talked about everyone except ourselves as an institution. We all have differences. We've all got bills that we didn't get passed that we wish were in different forms. We all hold feelings about each other and other branches of government, but today we lay those aside. You've been great members for the Legislature. Don't let anybody tell you differently. You've continued on a very sound, ethical manner of legislating in a very, very professional manner. We'll always have our critics. You don't silence the critics. What we do is do the state's business. For those people who trust you, and there's many, many Nebraskans who trust each and every one of you, you've done a wonderful job. The state relies on you now more than ever to address and solve their problems because they don't get easier, they only get harder. And as we begin to look forward to next year, I know you all are going to go home with a commitment to come back and work even harder because the problems are going to get harder and you're going to spend more time in the off-season. You're going to do it for low pay and for little or no appreciate from people that you meet and deal with. But that's not the reason you're here. This is a wonderful group of legislators and I think it's just an important time for us to stop and recognize all of you who work for this institution and make the state work. We've put aside our differences. The best time in the Legislature is to listen to our colleagues who are saying good-bye. The message we got from them is take serious the business of legislating; you're only here for a short period of time and that time goes so quickly. We all take for granted that we walk in and out of these doors every day and we do the state's most important business, and so the message that I received today from those colleagues who are leaving us is come back next year and do Nebraska's work. I know that you will. Mr. President, thank you.
