SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR QUANDAHL: ...and also the Exec Board? Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senators Baker, Kremer, and Mossey would move to amend the proposed Rules Committee amendment number three, and I might indicate to the membership copies have been distributed and on your desk. (Legislative Journal pages 93-94.)

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Baker to open on the amendment.

SENATOR BAKER: Thank you, Mr. Speaker and members. I commend Senator Beutler for his proposal. As he mentioned, I had presented a proposed rule change last...one of the special sessions, I can't remember which one now, I guess the last one, and he's pretty much done what I had hoped to do, and that was to provide uniformity between the Committee on Committees and Exec Board membership. And the only exception I can see to that is when we met last Friday, the Rules Committee, it was a rather hurried schedule. I believe we had a hearing at 9:00, we convened at 10:00 here, we're back. After Committee on Committees confirmed membership of the Rules Committee, we voted on this and, in all honesty, it happened so fast, and being a new member on the Rules Committee, that I hesitate to say, but I will, that I would back up and redo it again, I guess. So, hence, the amendment. My amendment simply leaves District 34, represented by Senator Kremer, in the 1st District, and Senator Mossey, District 3, in the 2nd District. We can debate this all day as to areas of interest, but both senators have signed on to my amendment. They desire to be...to remain where they are. And as Senator Beutler said, we do have another part of this before we solve it all and that's that we have to do,
