SENATOR BROWN: Number three. What is the majority of that district...which area is it located in?

SENATOR QUANDAHL: It's my understanding...and again, I didn't do a specific population count, but Senator Mossey lives in the 2nd Congressional District right now, which is the more populous area of that district. It is true that District 3 is partially urban in the 2nd District. But then it also goes into the 1st District in western Sarpy County also. And so there is a little bit of a mixture there too. Senator Stuhr's district also, with York and Seward Counties too, is one of those ones that's on both sides of the line. And so I just tried to approximate as best as I could where those communities of interest lie...lay.

SENATOR BROWN: So those are the only two that are sort of question marks?

SENATOR QUANDAHL: Yes.

SENATOR BROWN: Okay. Thank you very much.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Brown. Senator Engel. Excuse me. Senator Quandahl, your light was next. Do you wish to speak? It got inadvertently turned off, I believe, Senator Quandahl.

SENATOR QUANDAHL: That's...I'll pass if there are other speakers.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you. Senator Engel.

SENATOR ENGEL: Mr. Speaker, members of the body, I'd just like to say I oppose this change. I think in the past it's worked quite well. If something is working, why change it? And I realize it's the number game that you're playing here, and that's fine. If you need another number in the 1st District, well, I think you probably reshape things so that you can get that number. But the thing is, I think...we talk about commonality...I think up in District 17 and 16 and 19, have more in common with the 3rd District, as it has been in the past.
