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And so I would...I, as one, as representing District 17, would like to keep it that way. And I see Senator Brown shaking her head, but that's my opinion and it's probably not everybody else's opinion. And the only thing is, I would like to hear from the other senators that are affected here. Senator Tyson is here, and I think...I don't see Senator Cunningham. But I just want to voice my opinion that I am against this change, in all due respect to you and yours. So with that, I'll close for now. Thank you.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Engel. Senator Brown.

SENATOR BROWN: Mr. President, members, I'm sure that the individuals who are comfortable with the way things are, are going to reject a change. But as I said before, the way that we ended up here, I believe, was fairly capricious in terms of logic. And it's going to be difficult for us to make a change, because it's going to involve individuals who have feelings one way or the other. But I support this because it is objectively explainable to the people who we represent who were party to us making the changes in the congressional lines. And I think that that should be what causes us to make a change, and not individuals who are currently here but may not always be here. Thank you.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Brown. Senator Beutler.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Mr. Speaker, members of the Legislature, I don't want to prolong this debate. Senator Quandahl has indicated that he will be withdrawing the amendment. But I was a little taken aback by...and want to reiterate the rationale for this...for the structure of the main amendment, because I don't consider it capricious in any sense of the word. This structure that you have before you, not Senator Quandahl's but the main amendment, is extremely logical. Ever since the beginning of the state, Lincoln has been the south of the Platte city. And it has worked with surrounding rural areas in all directions, from the beginning of the state. It is a commercial area. It is an economic area. It makes total sense to have this particular caucus structured the way it is. And frankly, I think the congressional breakdown is totally illogical in terms
