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think that we do need some measure of check and balance here, because we are one house. We are, by all accounts, almost becoming two different societies in Nebraska. We have booming economic development in certain parts of the state. We have other parts of the state that are struggling just to keep storefronts open. So we have to take that into account in all of our decisions, and I think we will. But I don't think that this is the appropriate time, especially with the financial decisions that we're going to be facing this session, to make this particular rule change, and I would urge you not to do so. There are some other things that I was going to comment on. I may put my light on again. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Bromm. Senator Brashear.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Mr. President, members of the body, I rise in respectful opposition to the Maxwell motion to suspend, and otherwise. And since my... something I did previously was referenced, I feel a need to extend my comments and comment on several things. First of all, I will not concede, notwithstanding my great respect for Senator Maxwell, I will not concede to Senator Maxwell or anyone else in the body that the parliamentary technique which I previously used and withdrew is not still valid and viable. For those who were not here, what I had done was move the previous question, notwithstanding eight hours, notwithstanding anything else. And any member has the right to do that at any time. And what made people uncomfortable was that if you move the previous question and the Chair says, you can't do that, you're out of order, there's something this body ought to keep in mind, and that is, you can always overrule the Chair. It is well-established parliamentary law that the majority always rules. And the majority can't make a rule that says the majority can't rule. So if the Chair says you're out of order when you move the previous question, and you say, I respectfully appeal the decision of the Chair, and 25 people decide with you they will overrule the Chair, that decision has been made. That's the motion that I didn't push to the brink and I withdrew. It is still viable and valid, and I don't believe it has anything to do with this debate, notwithstanding Senator Maxwell's characterization. So let's put that aside. We have, in this instance, recently modified
