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say three or four times how much he respected me that something terrible must be coming. (Laughter) And whatever this is, it's not a frolic, I assure you. I've had extended conversations with Senator Chambers, and smaller conversations with others. I did go to the Rules Committee. Whatever this is, this is not a frolic, and I take exception to it in this sense. When I ran for this body as a candidate, people ask you, why are you running for the Legislature? I did not have in my pocket an agenda, a bill, a five-point plan, or something else. What I told people was, I want to be a strong voice for you in that conversation in Lincoln every year that affects all of us in many ways. I love the Legislature. I love the process. It is dignity for the process, it's the integrity of the Legislature that motivates me. That's why I take exception to a word like "frolic." Whatever it is, it's not a frolic. Now, others can reach a different conclusion. That's fine. I understand that. But however you want to characterize this, it's no frolic. I think it's serious. Another serious point, a statement was made that my motion here is antidemocratic, or trying to squelch debate or stifle opinions and so forth. Not at all. As I said at the outset, I intended that to be the vehicle for debate. Let me tell you what I heard in committee, in the Rules Committee. One statement was made there that, this proposal sounds good, and I would support it, but I don't necessarily want to discuss it for days and days and days and days. Time is precious. We have many important things to take care of. And I said, well, it's not my intention to discuss this forever. We can handle it fairly quickly. The response was, that may not be your intention, but that's what might happen. Well, friends, to me, that just points out the problem that we have here. So my effort here was to present it and still have a way to keep the debate within a reasonable time frame. It certainly wasn't to squelch anyone's opinion. If anybody needs some time in this debate, I think I've still got a turn or two. Don't I, Mr. President, before I close?

SENATOR CUDABACK: You have one more plus closing, Senator Maxwell.

SENATOR MAXWELL: Do I? Okay. I'd be glad to yield time to anybody who thinks time is running short or hasn't had enough
