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Exec Board is really down here kind of fumbling around with internal policies and that's about all we can handle for the time that we have, and hopefully we handle them well. But there are a few things right on the edge where our internal policies are intricately interrelated with the policies of every...other agencies of government, such as the auditing function, and in those cases we probably do reach out to be sure that we protect our own institution, and I hope you would be supportive of that. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Beutler. Mr. Clerk, an amendment.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Smith would move to amend Senator Schimek's proposal. (Legislative Journal page 111.)

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Smith, you're recognized to open on your amendment to the Schimek amendment.

SENATOR SMITH: Thank you, Mr. President, members. It was earlier noted that, in line 5 of Senator Schimek's proposal, that the Reference Committee referred to itself. Actually, the Reference Committee cannot refer to itself, and in this case it meant to be Executive Board, and I propose that "itself" be replaced with "Executive Board." Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Smith. Open for discussion on the Smith amendment to the Schimek amendment. Senator Schimek, did you wish to address? Your light was on, Senator Schimek.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes, thank you, Mr. President, members. Yes, I rise in support of the Smith amendment and say that I would be favorable to looking at the entire language. But, Senator Chambers, I have to say that I think the language is clearer than what already exists in the rules, which say that...which says that when the issue presented by the legislative bill or resolution is one of general import to the Legislature. What does that mean, Senator Chambers? I don't think we know what it means, and I was hoping in a short period of time to make it clear. And maybe I didn't make it clear. Maybe I just muddled
