those things that pertain to the individual member. I was being addressed, I won't say attacked, I was being addressed as an individual member and I didn't think I needed to say anything on that. But I'm a member of the Executive Board and I'm very jealous and protective of the Legislature as an institution, and I feel the same way about the Executive Board. I am not going to quietly and docilely allow the prerogatives of that board to be eroded. I will not sit idly by and allow the integrity of the process, I didn't say the integrity of individuals, the integrity of the process by which the Executive Board functions to be attacked and challenged without offering a defense. Senator Schimek came to me about this domestic-violence related bill. Members of the Executive Board recall that what I said during our deliberations was that bills of that kind had gone to the Judiciary Committee and the Government Committee, and it didn't matter to me which place they went but all such bills should go to one committee or the other. And I believe anybody at the Executive Board this morning will confirm that that's what I said. So I moved that the bill go to the Judiciary Committee, because I knew such bills had gone there, having been on the committee, having heard such bills, having received testimony on such bills from Senator Schimek. But those kind of things can easily be resolved without changing the rules, and I told her earlier today that if she wanted to ask the Executive Board to rerefer that bill to the Government Committee, and all such similar bills would go to the Government Committee, I have no objection. But if the easy ones are going to go to the Government Committee, then some of the others are going to go to the Judiciary Committee, I will not agree with that. The subject matter determines. That can be worked out. What Senator Schimek is offering to us is not a clarification. I still am going to argue that the types of bills we are referring to the Executive Board, namely, those that relate to the salaries of the legislators, those that would relate to activities being performed or conducted by the legislative branch or those subsidiaries of the Legislature which some bill is trying to give to a different branch of government. I will still try to have those referred to the Executive Board. I don't know which bills specifically could be brought up here that I would say ought not to have gone to the Executive Board, because I would not have voted to send them there if I didn't
