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or maybe with the bank. The bill two years ago stated that any sale of farm machinery that was under \$25,000, you could charge a maximum origination fee of \$100. If the sale price was over \$25,000, the maximum you could charge for installment fees would be \$250. At that time, it did not include industrial equipment. Many of the dealers sell farm equipment and industrial equipment. And many times it's even the same piece of equipment. It it's a loader, if it's sold as an agriculture purpose, you could charge an origination fee of the \$100 or the \$250, whichever would apply to the cost. But when it was sold to an industrial...for industrial use, then the maximum it could be would have to be \$10, which was kind of inconsistent when it was many times the same machine. So this simply adds to that list of machinery that are sold from...it includes not only agriculture equipment, but also commercial or industrial equipment. The maximum, again, that they could charge in origination fees, would be the cost of doing the paperwork, doing all the filing of the papers. Could be, if the sale is under \$25,000, it would be \$100 maximum fee they could charge. If the sale is over \$25,000, the maximum they could charge would be \$250. I'd be glad to answer any questions. If there are none, I would ask you to advance the bill.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Kremer. Senator Bourne.

SENATOR BOURNE: Thank you, Mr. President, members. Senator Kremer, I do have a couple of questions. We heard this bill, I think it was a couple of years ago, when I was on the Banking Committee. And I believe...did we indefinitely postpone the bill at the time?

SENATOR KREMER: No. Two years ago, we did pass it with the farm machinery only.

SENATOR BOURNE: Okay.

SENATOR KREMER: Then last year, we introduced this bill as it is now, and it was advanced from the committee, but we never did get to hear it on the floor. So now we're just coming back in and adding...
