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my new acquaintance, young Senator Mossey, who was a police officer. And he has a police officer's mentality and set of mind on certain issues, because that's what he made his living doing. And he will have things to offer, based on his experience, that are very helpful and beneficial. But it would be a mistake for him to think that the Judiciary Committee, for example, would be run like a police union, or that a member of the Legislature is going to be intimidated by a cop like a person on the street...

PRESIDENT HEINEMAN: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...might be intimidated. But I'm not intimidated by cops anywhere. And we have too many people in this Legislature who have been here awhile and they will not notify new members of anything, and they'll let them blunder and stumble and look foolish and be talked about behind their back, behind the hand whispered about, mocked and laughed at. But if I have something to say, I'm going to say it. And when an issue comes up openly and notoriously, I'm going to discuss it openly and notoriously. And if people's feelings get hurt, well, that's what medications are for. Sometimes the doctor...I better turn my light on again, because my time is up.

PRESIDENT HEINEMAN: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: Mr. President, briefly, excuse me, Senator. The Executive Board will meet under the north balcony for just a short Executive Session; Exec Board, underneath the north balcony.

PRESIDENT HEINEMAN: Thank you, Mr. Clerk. The Chair recognizes Senator Beutler. Senator Beutler, you're recognized.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Mr. Lieutenant Governor, members of the Legislature, Senator Mines, I'm...it's great to see you engaging yourself immediately in this. That's what it's all about. Let me ask you just this one question, if I may.

PRESIDENT HEINEMAN: Senator Mines.
