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SENATOR MINES: Okay.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...not dead, but has been discommoded for a longer period of time than people thought. Then you just have to wait till that person comes back, correct?

SENATOR MINES: Or take the warrant issues to that person.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. Now suppose one of these boards would feel that they ought to have another person to countersign, that the chairperson and one other board member, just for safety purposes. This says the chairperson. Why don't we let the local people decide that issue?

SENATOR MINES: That's probably not a bad idea, now that you mention it.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So would you want to strike that language?

SENATOR MINES: No. No, I wouldn't.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Senator Mines. And here's the point that I'm making. Everything that I'm talking about is going to ultimately revolve around who are the members of this board and how many such people there are. I presume the board elects a chairperson. So if you have a chairperson which some people...

PRESIDENT HEINEMAN: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...who deal with this board don't like...let's say you have five members, and you have an unlimited number that can be on the board. Then you get six people and have them appointed. And then, however that five voted, if they voted in a solid block, these six will outvote them on everything. There was an attempt to pack the U.S. Supreme Court, so if packing will occur at that level, it certainly will occur here. And I do respect Senator Mines' opinion. I think he made a good point about local control. But I think it doesn't have an application with reference to this
