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regulations that impact on the public at large, and not where you have a board dealing with a specific facility, then I would agree with her. For example, I think the Game and Parks Commission should have proportional representation. I know that the city council should, and that's why I got district elections there. I got district elections for the county board, and for the school board, because I do believe, for the reasons that Senator Redfield stated, that proportional representation is appropriate in some settings, but I would take a different position from hers on this particular board. I don't think proportional representation is what we're talking about at all. But since she addressed her comment to Senator Beutler, maybe he agrees with her. I'm just speaking for myself. And the reason I do that, I don't want there to be a misperception about my position on these broad subjects, when we get to them, such as proportional representation. I don't want it to seem that I'm saying that a board like this should have proportional representation, but because of some attitude I have about the number of people on the board, I want to do away with it. No, I'm making it clear that in my view proportional representation is not even a part of the discussion. Later on, Senator Schrock and I are going to have the opportunity to regale the body for a long time on a particular matter. And he is going to let a group, as will Senator Stuhr, impose fees on people, even though the commission that is going to impose these fees does not believe in proportional representation.

PRESIDENT HEINEMAN: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So at that time, I will have a different point of view. And Senator Stuhr and I are going to have a long talk. Some of you all who are older remember a comic strip called "Plastic Man", and this guy could stand where I am and stretch his hand from here to China if he wanted to. So we're going to have a "Plastic Man" discussion. But I think Senator Stuhr might be more reasonable than Senator Schrock, so I'm going to have a little conference with her before I discuss her bill. Thank you, Mr. President.
