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Burling, the same appeals process as there would be in, say, the city of Hastings.

SENATOR BURLING: Well, what is that? Do you know?

SENATOR HARTNETT: I don't know, Senator. I will find out.

SENATOR BURLING: Okay. Well, with the State Fire Marshal deputies, give citations for code violations, there's an appeal process. And I just wondered what it was for the cities that use this procedure. And so I'm concerned about the same things that the people in front of me have spoken about. And I have some real questions about going to villages this small with this type of enforcement. So, thank you very much.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Hartnett.

SENATOR HARTNETT: I'll waive.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Hartnett, did you waive off? Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, this is a bill that I have a strong enough opinion against that I'm going to offer a kill motion. I'm not going to take the Legislature's whole time on a bill of this nature. But what I wish some of my colleagues would do is to help me make our job easier by explaining to that municipalities group, explaining to these little cities that just because something in the statute relates to a metropolitan-class city, a city of the primary class, or of the first class, it doesn't mean that all a smaller city has to do is come in here and say, well, you let them do it, let us do it too, and the committee gives them a bill. I'm not going to agree to that. If I were on that committee, I would probably be voting no on a lot of these bills, and they'd come out here anyway, but I would express my opposition to those bills. As a member of the Legislature, I have an obligation, in an abstract sense, to read and be aware of everything in every bill. Realistically, that is not going to happen. So those bills that I think have an inappropriate impact on the citizens who are to be affected by the operation of that bill, I try to
