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material utilized for the purpose of determining blood alcohol content. With that agreement on the part of Senator Jensen, I'm not going to delay the bill. I'm not going to try to fashion any language on the floor at this time. I'm not going to ask that anything be deleted from the bill. Thus far, Senator Jensen has always lived up to any arrangement that had been made, and this one we can work out without...

SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...talking to HHS, because all we need to do is get the language to do what we all agree on. The other instance where I wanted to delete the language was done because it's going to be necessary that we get some additional information from HHS. I want them to know that in the same way that I gave an example this morning where the sword of Damocles was hanging over my head, well, the sword of "Ernie-cles" is hanging over HHS' head, and the sword of "Ernie-cles" makes the sword of Damocles look like a penknife. Thank you, Mr. President.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Seeing no further persons wishing to discuss the advancement of the bill, Senator Jensen, you're recognized to close on the advancement of LB 245.

SENATOR JENSEN: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. And, yes, I have agreed with Senator Chambers that we would look and also probably do a subsection to take care of that DNA testing. We currently are keeping samples for two years and it is the department's desire that we would continue to do that. However, last year we had 2,400 blood samples sent to the lab, and we now have over 5,000 samples that we are keeping in refrigerators. But I absolutely agree with Senator Chambers that this can be done, should be done, and we'll create a subsection in...to take care of that and we'll have that ready on Select File. With that, we've had a good discussion of the bill. We'll also get to Senator Beutler with his questions regarding the water wells also before Select File. So with that, I would just urge adoption of LB 245 to Select File. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Jensen. You've heard the
